Title	INTERPROFESSIONAL COLLABORATION PRACTICE ON INTEGRATED ANTENATAL CARE SERVICES. AN INDONESIAN CASE
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Content	<p>Integrated care as the highest level of collaborative care has been proven to provide high-quality health services. High-quality antenatal care (ANC) is a key success in reducing maternal mortality rate program and interprofessional collaboration practice (IPCP) must be part of it. This study aims to evaluate the implementation of interprofessional collaboration in an integrated ANC at the Primary Health Centre (PHC). A Sequential explanatory mixed-method was conducted on Four PHC. There were 149 medical records reviewed to assess the implementation of interprofessional collaborative services during antenatal care. Subsequent in-depth interviews were conducted with midwife, physician, nutritionist to determine the contributing factors of IPCP. There were only 6% (9 pregnant women) who received collaborative services. The level of IPCP in PHC was parallel services, the health professionals independently managed the patient. The contributing factors of IPCP were lack of clear role and responsibility, interprofessional communication, too many patients, over workload, patient positive perception about IPCP and financial support. This study found that IPCP was not implemented in ANC services, rearrangement of roles and responsibilities of each professional. Hence the IPCP can be properly implemented to promote a high-quality health service for all pregnant women.</p>
